

Lehigh Students Make Raft For Trip Down Delaware

Three Lehigh Valley students floated down the Delaware River today on six "doors of wisdom".

They launched their raft at the Pennsylvania Power & Light Co.'s landing at Martins Creek and were to pass Easton as the first landmark on their 140-mile trip by night.

The three are Joseph Gellings, 23, of Chicago; Rick Vernay, 25, of Port Chester, N.Y., and Pete Anselmo, 23, of Hicksville, Long Island, all roommates at Lehigh University.

They hoped the 18 inner tubes they used for their raft would keep them afloat all the way to Cape May, N.J.

"We used Bernoulli's principle of floating to figure how many tubes we needed and each

of the 18 will hold the weight of a 150-pound person," Gellings explained.

The trip was inspired by the Beatles song, "Turn Off Your Mind, Relax and Float Down the River", the three said.

And that is pretty much what they have in mind for their four-day adventure, although Gellings brought along James Baldwin's "Another Country" and Anselmo a fishing rod. "Something might bite," he said.

To be comfortable, they brought along a \$5 couch. It was placed in the middle of the raft as a throne.

Other "baggage" included a red lantern, sleeping bags, and a six-drawer white chest.

"We had to have something to keep the beer, the beans and the canned stew in," they explained. They also took a batch of bananas along, although they don't plan to smoke them!

A bottle of wine was hidden in a sack to "celebrate" their arrival at Philadelphia. They don't know when, that will be but hope for Sunday.

For their arrival at Cape May they have a champagne feast in mind before hitchhiking back.

Gellings and Anselmo are graduate students, majoring in psychology and guidance counseling. Vernay, a senior, also is a psychology major.
