## THE CEMETERIES OF EASTON.

Prior to 1849, when the public burial ground known as the Easton Cemetery was established, there were six places within the city limits for the interment of the dead. The most ancient of these is that of the Third Street Reformed Church, situated at the corner of Fifth and Church streets. The ground was donated to the society by the Penn heirs and in it was buried, in 1757, William Parsons, who in 1750 laid out the town and may well be called the father of Easton.

The next burial ground was that surrounding the Lutheran Church on Ferry street. The march of improvement compelled its abandonment some years ago, most of the bodies being removed to the Public Cemetery. Some where within this old enclosure were

burial ground. It contains the bodies of many of the oldest parishioners of the church, and tombstones, on which are names of men prominent in the social, political and business progress of the vicinity, are not wanting.

On South Sixth near Pine was located the first Hebrew cemetery. The ground was donated to the congregation by the heirs of Meyer Hart, the first Hebrew who settled in Easton and the first storekeeper of the town. Some time ago a new plot was purchased on Washington street, since which time the interments of the dead of that denomination have been made there. In 1887, the Hart donation was sold by the congregation, and the remains therein carefully exhumed and removed to the Washington street plot. The Syna-

interred the remains of George Taylor, Easton's signer of the Declaration of Independence.

Around "Little Trinity," on Spring Garden street were put to rest the bodies of many of Easton's old and well known citizens. When in 1869, the "White Church" was demolished and the enlarged structure substituted, many of the remains were removed, leaving but a few gravestones and mounds within the enclosure.

Many very old tombstones containing well known family names mark the graves of those buried in the Presbyterian cemetery at the corner of Second and Bushkill streets. It extends from the street to the creek and is the fourth interment place in point of age within the limits of the city.

Adjoining St. Bernard's Church is the Catholic

gogue members, owing to the increase in their numbers are now canvassing the advisability of purchasing a section of the Public Cemetery grounds, and devoting it exclusively to the interment of those who die in the Jewish faith.

## THE EASTON CEMETERY.

In 1849, Dr. Traill Green originated the project of establishing a public cemetery by circulating a paper in the form of an agreement, containing the following conditions:—

1st. As soon as a sufficient number of names shall have been secured, a meeting shall be called and a committee appointed to select the grounds.

2nd. An architect shall then examine and give his opinion concerning the grounds, which opinion, the selection committee shall report to the subscribers.

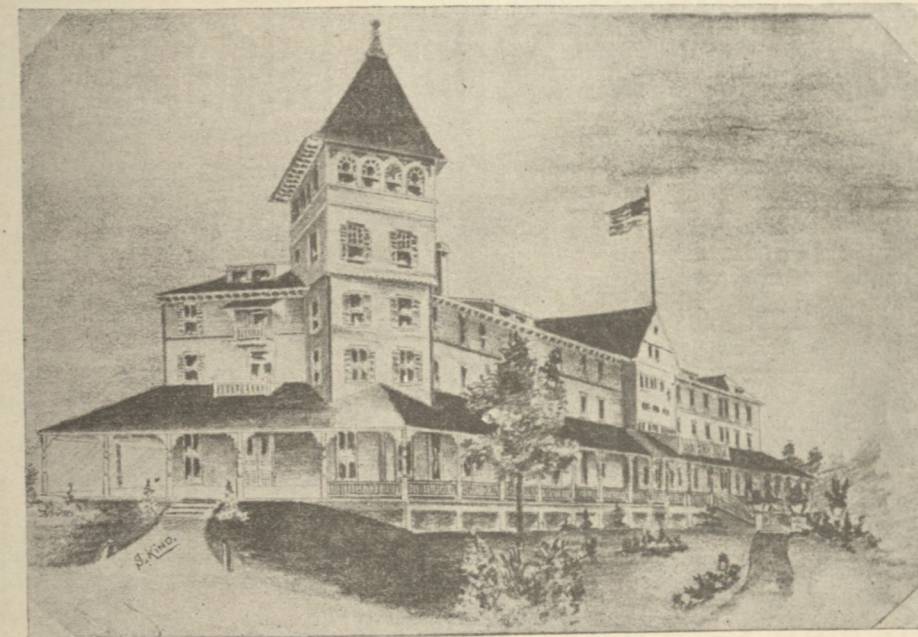
attract mechanics from abroad; to promote the trade, commerce, manufactures and mechanical arts of the city; to establish and maintain uniformity in commercial usages; to inculcate principles of justice and equity in business; to correct abuses; to acquire and disseminate valuable commercial and statistical information; to facilitate the adjustment of controversies in trade; and in general to foster, protect and advance the interests of the business community.

What energy, zeal and a union of hands, brains and wealth can accomplish in a few short months, the appended descriptions of the proposed boot and shoe undertaking, carving company and reorganization of the organ works—all due to the efforts and enthusiasm of the members of the Industrial Association—will sufficiently tell. Progress is still being made,

#### THE EASTON CLOCK COMPANY.

The first enterprise brought to the attention of the association was the desire of a Mr. Clay of New York to organize a company for the manufacture of a clock on a new and improved plan. Several meetings were held, Mr. Clay exhibiting his invention and describing its merits. A committee of the association was selected, who were to visit the works in Jersey City, where a watch, patented by Mr. Clay, the mechanism of which was identical with that of his clock, was being manufactured. This committee's report was fa-

but the work is not yet complete. A permanent organization has been effected and the association is both anxious and willing to correspond with factors and inventors of legitimate and useful articles with a view to their location in our midst. A list of the officers and directors is therefore appended so that to whomsoever this book may come, the names of those interested in our industrial progress may be at hand, and correspondence on any desired subject be opened.

Then for some reason—either want of confidence in the inventor, or failure on his part to fulfil the conditions agreed upon—the company decided to disband, the money of the subscribers was returned, and the Easton Clock Company wound up its affairs.

#### THE LAWRENCE ORGAN WORKS.

The reinvigoration of the Lawrence Organ Works, whose output had become limited through want of capital, yet which was over-run with orders for instruments impossible to supply, was next brought to the attention of the association. A critical and exhaustive examination of the business of 1888, during which
